




Ad 1 - A long history of living on water Noah, left St Seven 1100 - right bible 1478

A watermill without a wheel? Floating watermills since 537 AD on the Tiber in Rome. Inspiration for Michaelangelo? (Sistine chapel 1508)




Is there progress in design? On the left 1100 AD; On the right 2000 AD






Ad 1 - A long history of living on water For eternal life, a ship burial



Not only the Vikings. Around 650 AD, Sutton Hoo, England

First records in a Chinese encyclopedia from 800 AD. A permanently inhabited raft in China 1671




- The Netherlands was formed in 1568 and from that time on there have been records of people who permanently live on water
- At the same time there were already contacts in Asia and Indonesia

Ad 1 - A long history of living on water The oldest picture of houseboats around 1650 in Amsterdam: converted cargo vessels



Ad 2 - An interesting cultural heritage Lots happened on water



Heritage is a set of stories, places, buildings and objects within a group who pass on this information from generation to generation.

So,

if this *hat* has survived a few generations, it is heritage



2011: Remember the first houseboats of Amsterdam: holes in the hull, railings, a lot of plants and people on the roof. This has been a continuing cult behaviour for 360 years





The time of flower-power has gone. Some ships are left... but this no longer exists

Which of these boats is a houseboat?







One is a recent replica of a barge, the other is an original privatelyowned barge, which has survived thanks to its use as a houseboat. The third is a 'trading' ship around 1920, a floating shop/home used for commercial purposes

What do you see? Is it ugly and uninteresting?




Ad 2 - An interesting cultural heritage I see the remains of the ship's bridge of Hedel, a hull of at least hundred years old

1886 – 1912 in the centre of the city of Groningen, the home of the Lady's Rowing Club Wellgunde during its last days



Reinforced concrete vessels.

A former college barge of 1927 in England, which survived as a houseboat and conference centre



Ad 2 - An interesting cultural heritage Reinforced concrete vessels

Due to mooring conditions of the rowing club, Groningen 1912, the administrator had to leave his home on board....



It has to do with:

- 1. An open mind
- 2. Converted and new ships
- 3. Re-use or the digging/creation of new harbours

Open mind: boat people are not pirates



Open mind: do not demand a license for all



Open mind: do not exclude certain types of vessels
